# FIRST RESPONDENT'S ANSWERING AFFIDAVIT

I, the undersigned

#### CLAUDIA NONHLANHLA NDABA

hereby state under oath:

1. I am an adult female, a Member of Parliament and the Chairperson of the Portfolio Committee on Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities ("the Portfolio Committee"). I am duly authorized to depose to this answering affidavit on behalf of the Speaker of the National Assembly ("the Speaker"), the first respondent in these proceedings.



- 2. The contents of this affidavit are true and correct and, unless the context indicates otherwise, within my personal knowledge. Where I make submissions of a legal nature, I do so on the advice of the Speaker's legal representatives, which advice I accept as correct.
- 3. I have read the founding affidavit deposed to by Karam Singh on behalf of the applicant ("Corruption Watch") and respond to its contents herein. Before providing ad seriatim responses to the founding affidavit, I deal with the following thematic issues:
  - 3.1. The scope of the Court's powers to pronounce on public involvement processes.
  - 3.2. The failure by Corruption Watch to join the Chairperson and relevant members of the Commission for Gender Equality ("the Commission").
  - 3.3. An overview of the process followed in the recommendation of members for appointment to the Commission.
  - 3.4. Responses to the specific challenges raised by Corruption Watch.
  - 3.5. Condonation for the late filing of this answering affidavit.



# THE SCOPE OF THE COURT'S POWERS TO PRONOUNCE ON PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PROCESSES

- 4. The relief that Corruption Watch seeks includes an order declaring that Parliament, and by implication the Portfolio Committee, failed to comply with its constitutional obligation to facilitate reasonable public involvement before recommending persons to be appointed as members of the Commission.
- 5. The source of this obligation is section 193 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa, 1996 ("Constitution"), which provides as follows:
  - (1) The Public Protector and the members of any Commission established by this Chapter must be women or men who-
    - (a) are South African citizens;
    - (b) are fit and proper persons to hold the particular office; and
    - (c) comply with any other requirements prescribed by national legislation.
  - (2) The need for a Commission established by this Chapter to reflect broadly the race and gender composition of South Africa must be considered when members are appointed.
  - (3) . . .
  - (4) The President, on the recommendation of the National Assembly, must appoint the Public Protector, the Auditor-General and the members of-
    - (a) the South African Human Rights Commission;
    - (b) the Commission for Gender Equality; and
    - (c) the Electoral Commission.
  - (5) The National Assembly must recommend persons-
    - (a) nominated by a committee of the Assembly proportionally composed of members of all parties represented in the Assembly; and
    - (b) approved by the Assembly by a resolution adopted with a supporting vote-

- (i) of at least 60 per cent of the members of the Assembly, if the recommendation concerns the appointment of the Public Protector or the Auditor-General; or
- (ii) of a majority of the members of the Assembly, if the recommendation concerns the appointment of a member of a Commission.
- (6) The involvement of civil society in the recommendation process may be provided for as envisaged in section 59 (1) (a).
- 6. Section 193 of the Constitution is to be read with section 3(1) of the Commission for Gender Equality Act 39 of 1996 ("the Act"), which provides for two additional criteria for members of the Commission. In terms of section 3(1), members shall
  - 6.1. have a record of commitment to the promotion of gender equality; and
  - 6.2. be persons with applicable knowledge or experience with regard to matters connected with the objects of the Commission.
- 7. Corruption Watch's attack on the appointment of the chairperson and members of the Commission is not a substantive attack. Corruption Watch does not suggest that any of those appointed do not meet the appointment criteria set out in section 193(1) of the Constitution or section 3(1) of the Act. Its attack is confined to the procedure followed by the Portfolio Committee in facilitating public involvement in the identification of recommended candidates for appointment.



- 8. The first respondent does not dispute the existence of a duty to facilitate public involvement. However, the Constitution does not prescribe how this duty is to be discharged.
- 9. Section 59(1)(a) of the Constitution provides that the National Assembly must "facilitate public involvement in the legislative and other processes of the Assembly and its committees."
- 10. Section 57(1) of the Constitution provides that the National Assembly may -
  - (a) determine and control its internal arrangements, proceedings and procedures; and
  - (b) make rules and orders concerning its business, with due regard to representative and participatory democracy, accountability, transparency and public involvement.
- 11. Parliament is therefore afforded a broad discretion to determine how to discharge its obligation to facilitate public involvement.
- 12. I am advised that this Court has held that this was deliberate: the doctrine of separation of powers requires that Parliament and the provincial legislatures have a significant measure of discretion to determine how best to facilitate public involvement. This is one of their core responsibilities as the legislative arm of government and the democratically-elected representatives of the public with whom they are to consult.



- 13. This Court has also recognised that what is required of Parliament to meet its obligations will vary according to the specific facts and circumstances of each case. As such, what is required of Parliament in facilitating public involvement is a contextual consideration that stands to be guided by the type and scope of decision or process it is engaged with at a given time.
- 14. Ultimately, the question for determination is not whether the extent of public involvement and the procedure followed by the Portfolio Committee is the one that would have been adopted by the Court, but rather whether the Portfolio Committee provided a reasonable opportunity to members of the public and all interested parties to have an adequate say on issues affecting them.
- 15. In this regard it is important to keep the following considerations in mind:
  - appointments to the Commission. The nature of the public interest in these recommendations differs from, for example, the nature of the public interest in the enactment of legislation that will directly regulate how those bound are to conduct themselves. As such, the manner in which public involvement is facilitated in the context of recommendations in terms of section 193 of the Constitution will differ from the manner in which it is facilitated in the law-making process.
  - 15.2. In the case of recommendations for appointment to a Chapter 9 institution, there are rigorous screening and vetting processes that take

place over and above the public involvement processes. Each shortlisted candidate is screened by the State Security Agency prior to interviews being conducted. Their qualifications are also verified by Parliament's Human Resources Division. Once the recommended candidates are identified, they are subjected to a further vetting process. In the case of candidates for appointment to the Commission, this vetting process is conducted at the instance of the Department of Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities. As such, there are several sources of information as to each candidate's fitness and propriety to hold office, with the comments received from members of the public being only one such source.

- 15.3. In dealing with appointments to Chapter 9 institutions, there exist set timeframes within which recommendations for appointment are to be made, in order to avoid situations where delays in filling vacancies render these institutions inquorate and unable to function in the discharge of their constitutional mandates. In the case of the Commission, section 3(1) of the Act prescribes that there be a chairperson and no fewer than seven members at all times. Corruption Watch recognises in its founding affidavit that the possibility of an inquorate Commission was one of the factors that had to be taken into account in the design of the public involvement process.
- 15.4. The processes followed and time frames permitted for public comment are well within (and in some cases in excess of) the standard time frames

applied in invitations for public comment on appointments to other Chapter 9 institutions. For example –

- 15.4.1. The invitation to comment on the shortlist of candidates for appointment as the Deputy Public Protector was published on 19 February 2024. The closing date for submissions was 23 February 2024. I refer to annexure "PC1", which is a copy of the invitation for comment.
- 15.4.2. On 12 July 2023, an invitation for comment in the shortlisted candidates for appointment to the Office of the Public Protector was published. Members of the public were afforded until 21 July 2023 to submit their comments. I refer to a copy of the invitation for comment, attached as annexure "PC2".
- 15.4.3. The invitation to comment on the shortlist of candidates for appointment to the South African Human Rights Commission was published on 25 September 2023. Members of the public were invited to submit their comments on the shortlisted candidates by 6 October 2023. A copy of the invitation for comment is attached as "PC3".
- 15.4.4. On 6 August 2020, members of the public were invited to comment on the shortlist of candidates for appointment as



Auditor-General. The closing date for comments was 14 August 2020. A copy of the invitation is attached as "PC4".

- 15.4.5. During 2016, members of the public were invited to submit comments on the shortlist of candidates for appointment to the position of Public Protector. Comments from members of the public were received between 27 June 2016 and 1 July 2016. I refer to the press statement attached as annexure "PC5".
- 15.4.6. I refer the Court to the confirmatory affidavit deposed to by Dr Herman Tembe, who is the Legal Officer in the Office of Institutions Supporting Democracy: Speaker's Office ("OISD"). The OISD initiates recruitment and facilitates, advises on and monitors statutory appointments to the institutions supporting democracy. Dr Tembe's affidavit will be filed together with this answering affidavit, alternatively soon thereafter.
- 16. Given the considerations discussed above, I am advised that there exists no basis for the Court to usurp the function of the legislative branch of government and to second-guess the approach adopted by the Portfolio Committee to facilitate public involvement. The process that was followed, as I set out in further detail below, was manifestly reasonable, and allowed a meaningful opportunity for members of the public to have their say in the recommendation process.



# NON-JOINDER OF THE CHAIRPERSON AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMISSION

- The relief that the applicant seeks includes an order declaring invalid the appointment of the Chairperson and members of the Commission on 1 March 2023. It seeks this relief without having cited these individuals as respondents in this application.
- 18. As such, those appointed to the Commission on 1 March 2023 stand to have their appointments declared invalid without being afforded the opportunity to participate in the proceedings should they wish to do so.
- 19. I am advised that this is not remedied by the joinder of the Commission itself as the third respondent. The Commission is an institution that exists separately from its members, and any interest that the Commission has in these proceedings may well differ from the interest held by its individual members.
- 20. In the circumstances, I submit that the applicant ought to be directed to join the chairperson and the members of the Commission appointed on 1 March 2023 before being permitted to proceed with its challenge.

# OVERVIEW OF THE PROCESS FOLLOWED IN THE RECOMMENDATION OF MEMBERS FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE COMMISSION

21. In providing an overview of the process followed, it is important to keep in mind the distinction between recruitment and appointment. Recruitment is conducted



by the legislative branch of government, in this instance led by the Portfolio Committee. The legislature makes recommendations to the President on suitable candidates for appointment. Their appointment is effected by the President, following which contracts of employment are concluded.

- 22. In conducting the recruitment process, the Portfolio Committee recognised the need to create stability within the Commission, and to facilitate a smooth transition in membership.
- 23. The Portfolio Committee commenced its process for the identification of candidates for recommendation for appointment to the Commission through the publication of an advertisement on 26 June 2022 calling for nominations and applications for individuals to serve on the Commission. A copy of the advertisement is attached as annexure "KS1" to the founding affidavit. As appears from that advertisement, the closing date for applications was 18 July 2022.
- 24. Corruption Watch addressed a letter to me following publication of the advert, contending that the timeframe of 22 days "may not be sufficient to attract a suitable pool of applications for consideration." They sought a one-week extension of the time frame allowed for applications and nominations to be submitted. A copy of this letter, dated 18 July 2022, is attached as "KS15" to the founding affidavit.



- 25. In my response (attached as "KS16 to the founding affidavit), I highlighted that the standard practice of Parliament is for there to be a period of two to three weeks provided for the receipt of applications or nominations. In this case, a period of 22 days had been afforded. I accordingly indicated that the time period for the submission of applications could not be extended.
- 26. The sufficiency of the timeframe for the submission of applications and nominations is demonstrated by the fact that the Portfolio Committee received some 165 applications before the deadline stipulated in the advert. Following the exclusion of duplicate applications, of which there were nine, there were 156 applications for the Portfolio Committee's consideration. This is borne out by the minutes of the Portfolio Committee meeting of 23 and 24 August 2022, copies of which is attached as annexure "PC6".
- 27. The minutes of the meeting conducted on 23 August 2022 are attached as annexure "KS2" to the founding affidavit. This meeting was convened at the earliest available opportunity, with members of the Portfolio Committee having returned from the National Assembly's constituency period on 15 August 2023.
- 28. On 2 September 2022, the Portfolio Committee published its shortlisted candidates and invited the public to comment via an online form to which a link was provided. The invitation for comment is attached as "KS3" to the founding affidavit. The following aspects of the invitation bear noting:



- 28.1. Members of the public were requested to make use of an online google form for the submission of their comments. A copy of this google form is attached as "KS4" to the founding affidavit. The Portfolio Committee opted to use this form to assist in streamlining the comments received: it would allow for the comments to be categorized according to the candidate to whom they related. Thus, the Portfolio Committee would be able to consider each candidate fully during its deliberation processes.
- 28.2. The invitation also provided a link to a spreadsheet setting out the names and qualifications held by each shortlisted candidate. The spreadsheet was prepared with a view to achieving a balance between providing information about each candidate's qualifications, allowing for an assessment of their suitability for recommendation for appointment, and the obligation to protect their personal information. By way of example, members of the public would be able to ascertain from the spreadsheet that
  - 28.2.1. Magdalene Moonsamy was awarded an LLB from the University of Westville in 2003. She also holds a qualification in activist and gender studies.
  - 28.2.2. Olave Nthabiseng Sepanya Mogale holds a BA in Social Work, a postgraduate H Dip in Advanced Social Work Practice, an LLB, an LLM and a certificate in legislative drafting.



- 28.3. The closing date for public comment was 16 September 2022. Members of the public were thus afforded 14 days to submit their comments. This is in line with the standard time periods permitted in public involvement processes relating to recommendations for appointment to chapter 9 institutions, as I have addressed above.
- 29. On 6 September 2022, I received a letter from Corruption Watch, in which they complained about the limited space available for comments to be submitted. Corruption Watch requested that full curricula vitae for each shortlisted candidate be published, and that they be permitted to submit comments directly to the Portfolio Committee Secretary rather than via an online form. A copy of this letter is attached as "PC7".
- 30. The Portfolio Committee met on the same day, and discussed the letter received from Corruption Watch. As per the minutes of this meeting, a copy of which is attached as "PC8", the Committee resolved that the public would be permitted to submit further comments on shortlisted candidates if their submissions exceeded the 2000-character count permitted on the google form. In such cases, submissions could be sent via e-mail to the Secretary of the Portfolio Committee.
- 31. This was communicated to Corruption Watch in a letter dated 16 September 2022, attached hereto as "PC9". In particular, Corruption Watch was informed that ~

- 31.1. The decision to publish candidates' academic qualifications in the format in which this was done was informed by Parliament's obligations arising from the Protection of Personal Information Act 4 of 2013 ("POPI Act"). The Portfolio Committee sought to balance the right to privacy against the right of access to information.
- 31.2. In taking this decision, the Portfolio Committee took cognizance of the fact that although candidates had opened themselves up to public scrutiny on their capabilities and potential, this does not amount to blanket consent for the processing of their personal information.

  Parliament had resolved to adopt a cautious approach in this regard.
- 32. In relation to the complaint from Corruption Watch about the character limit, the letter informed them of the following:

"Should individuals or civic organisations have additional information they wish to submit in relation to the candidates, they must feel free to do so to the Chairperson or Secretary of the Portfolio Committee. The Committee would not disqualify an individual because of negative public comment without offering audi alteram partem to the concerned candidate and weighing its gravity in relation to the position applied for. Furthermore, please be advised that the Committee will also conduct its own screening through the State Security Intelligence for the vetting to be completed by the appointing authority. Lastly, the process of public involvement in the processes also involve screening by State Security Agents that includes checks on the personal information of the candidates."



- 33. It appears that the letter to Corruption Watch was transmitted at the same time as Corruption Watch (through their attorneys of record) transmitted their letter of 16 September 2022 to me (a copy of which is attached as "KS18" to the founding affidavit). In their letter of this date, Corruption Watch demanded that the process for appointment of Commissioners to the CGE be suspended, that full curricula vitae be made publicly accessible, that any word or character limits be removed and that the timeframe for public comments be extended by 30 calendar days from the date on which full curricula vitae were made available.
- 34. I therefore addressed a further letter to Corruption Watch on 22 September 2022 in response to its letter of 16 September 2022. A copy of my response is attached as annexure "KS20" to the founding affidavit. The letter repeated the reasons why the Portfolio Committee adopted the approach to the public involvement process that it did, including a reiteration of the obligations arising from the POPI Act.
- 35. Corruption Watch did not respond to this letter, nor did they submit comments in relation to any of the shortlisted candidates.
- 36. However, a total of 656 public comments was received from other stakeholders. These comments related to 22 of the 24 shortlisted candidates. I attach as annexure "PC10" a summary of those comments. The following important aspects may be gleaned from this summary:

A

- 36.1. The comments range from brief words in support of particular candidates (for example, "a deserving winner", "such an inspiration" and "very capable and diligent lady") to substantial comments that engage with the candidate's qualifications and experience. By way of example, I refer the Court to the comments received from Saijal Bandulal / Soroptimist International Africa Federation in relation to Ms Bernadine Bachar (at page 14 of the attached summary), the comments received from Nonhlanhla Mkhize in relation to Ms Leonisha Leigh-Ann van der Merwe (at page 58 of the attached summary)
- 36.2. The comments originated from well-established organisations such as trade unions and civil society organisations, to individual members of the public who shared their experiences with the candidates.
- 36.3. A number of stakeholders submitted comments in relation to several candidates. Reference is made in this regard to the comments received from the South African Council of Churches and the Organisation Undoing Tax Abuse.
- 36.4. The comments received included both supportive statements and cautionary statements. By way of example, I refer to the comments received from OUTA in relation to Ms Candice Chirwa (page 33 of the attached document) and Ms Theresa Eulenda Mabusela (page 93 of the attached document).



- 37. Given the number of comments received and the breadth of stakeholders who submitted comments, I submit that there is clearly no merit to the contention by Corruption Watch that the public involvement process was inadequate. In this regard it is worth mentioning that in the previous process for the recommendation of candidates for appointment to the Commission, only six comments were received from members of the public.
- 38. Between 20 and 23 September 2022, the Portfolio Committee interviewed the shortlisted candidates. The interview process was open to members of the public. The report of these interviews is attached as annexure "KS6" to the founding affidavit. What is clear from this report is that the Portfolio Committee took seriously all public comments received, and gave the candidates an opportunity to engage with and respond to them.
- 39. On 26 October 2022, the Portfolio Committee met and deliberated on the interview process, identifying the names of candidates who would be recommended to the President for appointment. The National Assembly approved and adopted the report attached hereto as "PC11", which report details the process followed and the outcome thereof.
- 40. The National Assembly subsequently approved and adopted a supplementary report dated 15 November 2022, in which the terms to be served by each recommended candidate were clarified. A copy of this supplementary report is attached as "PC12".



- 41. Corruption Watch, however, continued to seek to have the process derailed.
- 42. On 11 November 2022, Corruption Watch addressed a letter to the Speaker, demanding that the recommendation process be halted and started afresh "to ensure constitutional compliance". This letter, a copy of which is attached as "PC13", fails to take account of the following:
  - The Portfolio Committee had already at that stage facilitated a full public involvement process during which an overwhelming public response was received. As I have addressed above, the Portfolio Committee received 656 comments from a range of stakeholders. Corruption Watch apparently refused to take part in this process.
  - 42.2. By the time that Corruption Watch addressed its letter to the Speaker, the vacancies on the Commission had already arisen. Starting the process afresh apart from being unnecessary and costly in the circumstances would have left the Commission inquorate for a period of approximately six months.
- 43. The Speaker responded to Corruption Watch on 29 November 2022, informing them that Parliament had concluded its recommendation process and the names of the recommended candidates had already been submitted to the President. A copy of this letter is attached as "PC14".

A

- 44. By that stage, Corruption Watch had in any event written to the President, requesting that the appointment process be halted, and the process started afresh. A copy of this letter is attached as "PC15".
- 45. The President accordingly addressed a letter to the Speaker on 30 November 2022 seeking assurance that the proper procedures and processes had been followed in recommending candidates for appointment to the Commission. A copy of this letter is attached as "PC16".
- 46. On 12 December 2022, I responded to the Speaker, in the attached letter marked "PC18". The letter outlined the process followed, and the manner in which the Portfolio Committee had effectively facilitated public involvement in the process, despite the objections raised by Corruption Watch.
- 47. The letter was followed by a memorandum to the Speaker on 15 December 2022.

  A copy of this memorandum is attached as "PC19". The memorandum attached a draft letter from the Speaker to the President, providing reassurance that the prescribed procedures had been followed. A copy of this draft letter is attached as "PC20".
- 48. The Speaker transmitted the letter to the President, having satisfied herself that adequate public involvement had been facilitated. The President finalised the appointments on 25 February 2023.



# RESPONSES TO SPECIFIC CHALLENGES RAISED BY CORRUPTION WATCH

- 49. Corruption Watch challenges the public involvement process followed on three grounds:
  - 49.1. First, the time afforded to members of the public for the submission of comments in relation to the shortlisted candidates;
  - 49.2. Second, the word limit applicable to the comments submitted; and
  - 49.3. Third, the publication of the shortlisted candidates' qualifications rather than their full curricula vitae.
- 50. There is no merit to any of these contentions.
- 51. The time afforded to members of the public for the submission of their comments was sufficient:
  - 51.1. As is clear from what I have stated above, the timeframe of 14 days was well in line with and in some cases in excess of the timeframes provided for in similar processes.
  - 51.2. In addition, the fact that 656 public comments were received suggests that ample time was afforded to members of the public to provide their input.



- 51.3. It was moreover necessary to ensure that, in addition to sufficient time being afforded, the appointments could be made prior to the vacancies arising, as a failure to do so would result in an inquorate Commission that would not be able to discharge its constitutional mandate.
- 52. The word limit was not a fixed restriction on public comments:
  - 52.1. An analysis of the comments received reveals that the vast majority of members of the public who wished to participate in the process were more than able to submit their comments through the google form, within the space allocated for this purpose.
  - 52.2. However, after receipt of Corruption Watch's complaint, I communicated the Portfolio Committee's amenability to receiving longer submissions via e-mail to the Secretary of the Portfolio Committee directly.
  - 52.3. It is therefore not clear why Corruption Watch persists in its complaint about the word limit.
- 53. There was sufficient information provided to allow for meaningful public involvement:
  - 53.1. It is common cause that each candidate's qualifications were made available to members of the public for the purpose of submission of

comments on the candidates' suitability for appointment. It can be ascertained from these qualifications whether the candidates have the knowledge and experience required to serve on the Commission, and whether they have demonstrated a commitment to the promotion of gender equality.

- 53.2. The Portfolio Committee took a considered view that the publication of additional information would be in breach of the candidates' rights to privacy as protected by, *inter alia*, the POPI Act. In this regard there is a distinction to be drawn between the submission of their curricula vitae to the Portfolio Committee for the purpose of the application, and the wide publication of their curricula vitae to members of the public.
  - 53.2.1. The definition of consent in the POPI Act requires such consent to be voluntary, specific and informed. This requires, *inter alia*, that separate consent be provided for each instance of processing of personal information. Consent for processing of personal information in one instance cannot be inferred or assumed to have been given for another instance.
  - 53.2.2. Candidates consented to their personal information being scrutinized by members of the Portfolio Committee only, The Portfolio Committee as the responsible party as defined in the POPI Act is required to exercise discretion in determining the purpose and means of processing the personal information and

the extent of the information to be published, while bearing a duty to protect the confidentiality of the candidates' personal information.

- 53.2.3. Since candidates had not consented to their curricula vitae being made available to members of the public, the Portfolio Committee considered it inappropriate for the full curricula vitae to be published.
- 53.3. The POPI Act is extremely broad in its application, and is directed at ensuring that personal information is not misused or abused in any way.

  Once released into the public domain, the Portfolio Committee has no control over how the information is used, including any further distribution. As the responsible party, the Portfolio Committee bears a duty to guard against this.
- 53.4. I acknowledge that the minutes of the meeting of 24 August 2022 record the intention of the Portfolio Committee to publish the curricula vitae of the shortlisted candidates. However, it was never my intention nor the intention of any other member of the Portfolio Committee to publish the curricula vitae in full. This was the terminology that we used to describe the information about candidates' qualifications. I regret that the use of this terminology caused confusion as to what would be published. This does not, however, negate the onerous obligations placed on the Portfolio Committee by the POPI Act.

- 53.5. I note that Corruption Watch differs in its interpretation of the POPI Act.

  While I maintain that the interpretation adopted by the Portfolio

  Committee is correct, I also record that it was important for the Portfolio

  Committee to err on the side of caution in upholding the legislation that binds everyone.
- 53.6. Had the individual candidates been cited as respondents in this application, it would have been possible for them to advise the Court of their attitude to the processing of their personal information in the manner demanded by Corruption Watch.
- 54. For these reasons, I submit that the application stands to be dismissed with costs.

# CONDONATION FOR THE LATE FILING OF THIS ANSWERING AFFIDAVIT

- 55. This answering affidavit has unfortunately been filed out of time, In directions issued by this Court on 29 January 2024, the opposing respondents were directed to file their answering affidavits by 19 February 2024. It was unfortunately not possible for the first respondent to meet this deadline.
- 56. The application was served on the Speaker on 1 December 2023, following permission to serve being granted as per annexure "PC21" hereto.

#

- Upon receipt of the application, the internal processes of obtaining the necessary authorisations and the procurement process for the appointment of counsel had to be followed. Parliament closed on 14 December 2023 and thus its internal processes could only be finalised on 15 February 2024.
- 58. The State Attorney was preliminarily instructed on 13 February 2024, to start the administrative process of having a State Attorney assigned to the matter. A formal instruction to oppose was given to the State Attorney on 15 February 2024, once the necessary internal authorisations were in place.
- 59. On the same date, the State Attorney notified the other parties of the Speaker's opposition to the application. I refer in this regard to the confirmatory affidavit deposed to by Mr Lawrence Ngwenya from the Office of the State Attorney, which will be attached.
- 60. Together with the notice of opposition, the State Attorney requested an indulgence to file the answering affidavit by 26 February 2024. A copy of the correspondence in this regard is attached as "PC22". In the attached e-mail marked "PC23", the General Office informed the State Attorney that it would be necessary to bring an application for condonation.
- Attorney is required to follow a prescribed procurement process in terms of which it must obtain quotations from prospective counsel, in addition to other documents to ensure that counsel are tax compliant, are in good standing with



the Legal Practice Council and have the requisite skills to perform the work required.

- 62. The State Attorney sent out a request for quotations on 16 February 2024. On the same date, a submission was made for deviation from the ordinary time periods applicable to the briefing of counsel, to allow the process to be conducted on an urgent basis.
- 63. Counsel was appointed on Monday 19 February 2023. Although she was furnished with a copy of the application on the same day, she could not commence with drafting the answering affidavit without taking instructions. It was therefore necessary to arrange a consultation with all of those involved in the public involvement process.
- 64. Unfortunately, I was not able to consult until 23 February 2024. The Parliamentary Programme included a number of prior commitments on my part, with important work that had to be attended to in order for the National Assembly to complete its work before the closure of the sixth sitting of Parliament. The comsultation was therefore arranged for the earliest possible date.
- 65. During the consultation, we provided counsel with the necessary instructions. However, she requested additional documents and information, some of which was in the possession of other functionaries. My team provided counsel with the outstanding documents and information over the weekend of 24 and 25 February 2024 and during the course of 26 February 2024. Although every effort was made

(\*)

to finalise the answering affidavit and serve and file it on 26 February 2024, this was unfortunately not possible.

- 66. I submit that what is set out above constitutes a reasonable explanation for the delay in filing the answering affidavit, which will be filed seven court days out of time.
- 67. I regret the late filing of the answering affidavit. It is not intended as a mark of disrespect for the Court or for the parties to the application.
- 68. I submit however, that the parties will suffer no prejudice as a result of this delay.

  The first respondent will not raise any objection to an extension of time for the filing of the replying affidavit.
- 69. On the other hand, a refusal of condonation would result in substantial prejudice. In addition to the Speaker not being permitted to place the full version of events before the Court to defend its position, there would be a prejudicial effect on the Court and the administration of justice in determining the existence of a breach of constitutional obligations without an explanation of the process from Parliament. Particularly in a matter involving recommendations for appointment to a Chapter 9 institution, which is both novel and important, I submit that the benefit of Parliament's account of the public involvement process is critical.
- 70. In the circumstances, I humbly pray that condonation be granted for the late filing of the answering affidavit.

()

#### **AD SERIATIM RESPONSES**

71. I turn now to respond ad seriatim to the contents of the founding affidavit. In doing so I have done my utmost to respond to each and every allegation therein. Where I have not responded to a particular allegation, and where that allegation is inconsistent with the contents of this answering affidavit, it ought to be taken as denied.

#### Ad paras 1 - 2

72. Save to deny that the contents of the founding affidavit are true and correct, the contents of these paragraphs are noted.

### Ad paras 3 - 4

73. I note the purpose of the application. I deny that Corruption Watch is entitled to the order it seeks.

#### Ad para 5

74. The contents of this paragraph are admitted.

# Ad para 6

75. I deny that Parliament failed to fulfil its constitutional obligation to facilitate public involvement. The process followed in obtaining public comment on candidates for recommendation for appointment to the Commission were reasonable and in compliance with the constitutional and statutory framework.



# Ad paras 7 - 14

76. Parliament is well aware of the importance of the role of the Commission in, inter alia, combating the scourge of gender-based violence in South Africa. As I have addressed above, Corruption Watch's challenges to the public involvement process have in fact risked derailing the process and leaving the Commission inquorate and unable to discharge is important mandate.

77. Save for the aforesaid, and to the extent that the allegations in these paragraphs are consistent with the Constitution and the Act, the contents of these paragraphs are noted.

## Ad para 15

78. I admit that there exists a duty to facilitate public involvement in the recommendation of candidates for appointment to the Commission. For the reasons set out above, I submit that Parliament complied with this duty.

#### Ad paras 16 - 17

79. The contents of these paragraphs are denied. I have addressed the specific allegations in relation to the process adopted above.

#### Ad paras 18 - 21

80. As I have stated above, Parliament takes seriously its duty to facilitate reasonable public involvement. Parliament also recognizes the important role

/

played by the Commission in the protection, promotion and advancement of constitutional rights.

81. I maintain, for the reasons set out above, that the process adopted was reasonable and in compliance with the constitutional and statutory mandate.

#### Ad para 22

82. The contents of this paragraph are noted.

#### Ad paras 23 - 27

83. The contents of these paragraphs are noted.

#### Ad paras 28 - 31

- 84. The contents of these paragraphs are noted.
- 85. As I have addressed above, Corruption Watch has failed to join as respondents the individual members of the Commission, who clearly have a direct and substantial interest in the relief sought. I submit that this matter cannot be adjudicated in the absence of these members.

#### Ad paras 32 - 36

86. The contents of these paragraphs are admitted only to the extent that they constitute an accurate recordal of the constitutional and statutory provisions referred to.

#### Ad para 37

87. For the reasons set out above, I deny that the public involvement process was neither reasonable nor meaningful.

#### Ad para 38

88. The contents of this paragraph are admitted.

# Ad para 39

- 89. As I have addressed above, my statement regarding the publication of curricula vitae was an unfortunate but bona fide use of the incorrect terminology. Neither the Portfolio Committee nor any of its members intended or understood that the full curriculum vitae of each shortlisted candidate would be published. This would have been in breach of our obligations in terms of the POPI Act as we understood them.
- 90. Instead, the intention was to publish information as to each shortlisted candidate's qualifications, to enable members of the public to comments on whether they were fit and proper, and appropriately qualified to serve on the Commission. This is the route that the Portfolio Committee followed.

#### Ad paras 40 - 42

91. The contents of these paragraphs are admitted. I have provided context for the contents of the invitation and the mode of public involvement above.

# Ad paras 43 - 45

92. The contents of these paragraphs are admitted.

93. As I have addressed above, it is important to keep in mind the need to conduct the recommendation process within the Parliamentary Programme, which imposes numerous commitments on members of the Portfolio Committee. To the extent that Corruption Watch suggests that there was any delay in the process, this is denied.

#### Ad para 46

94. I have addressed the nature and content of the submissions received above. I reiterate that they are reflective of a meaningful public involvement process during which members of the public were afforded a more than reasonable opportunity to have their say.

# Ad paras 47 - 49

95. The contents of these paragraphs are admitted.

#### Ad para 50

96. To the extent that Corruption Watch suggests that the Portfolio Committee was not responsive in the engagements referred to, this is denied. As I have addressed above, the Portfolio Committee engaged with Corruption Watch and in fact revised its process to accommodate one of the concerns that had been raised.

### Ad paras 51 - 52

97. As I have addressed above, I deny that members of the public were not provided with adequate information, an opportunity to have an adequate say and adequate time. The process followed was manifestly reasonable, as is demonstrated, *inter alia*, by the fact that 656 substantive comments were received.

#### Ad para 53 - 54

- 98. I admit receipt of the letter from Corruption Watch on 18 July 2022 and the response from my office on 12 August 2022.
- 99. I have addressed the contents of these letters above. In line with what is set out above, I deny that the timeframe allowed for nominations and applications was inadequate. Not only is this in line with the standard timeframe adopted by Parliament, but the Portfolio Committee received 165 applications pursuant to its advert. This makes clear that there was ample opportunity for candidates to submit their applications.

### Ad para 55

- 100. I admit receipt of the letter dated 6 September 2022. I deny the contents thereof.
- 101. I further deny that the Portfolio Committee was unresponsive. As I have addressed above, the Portfolio Committee received a letter from Corruption Watch on the same day, in which the same complaints were raised. The Portfolio Committee discussed these complaints in its meeting of 6 September 2022 and responded to Corruption Watch based on that discussion.

102. Notably, the response from the Portfolio Committee included provision for the submission of comments in excess of 2000 characters directly to the Portfolio Committee Secretary. Not only did the Portfolio Committee respond to Corruption Watch, therefore, but it made accommodation for those concerns that could reasonably be accommodated.

# Ad paras 56 - 57

- 103. I admit receipt of the letter dated 16 September 2022. I deny the contents thereof.I have addressed the contents of that letter above.
- 104. I specifically deny that the public involvement process was flawed or opaque in any way. I have addressed above the reasonableness of this process, including the Portfolio Committee's responsiveness to Corruption Watch and its accommodation of those concerns that could reasonably be accommodated.
- 105. I further deny that the Portfolio Committee failed to respond to the letter from Corruption Watch dated 16 September 2022. In addition to transmitting a letter to Corruption Watch on 16 September 2022 responding to its concerns, I provided a specific response to the letter of 16 September 2022 in my letter of 22 September 2022.

# Ad paras 58 - 59

106. I admit receipt of the letter from Corruption Watch's legal representatives on 20 September 2022. For the reasons set out above, I deny the contents of that letter.

#### Ad para 60

- 107. The contents of this paragraph are admitted. As I have addressed above, the process adopted by the Portfolio Committee was reasonable and allowed for meaningful public involvement in the recommendation process.
- 108. Like other members of the public, Corruption Watch was provided sufficient information, adequate time and a reasonable opportunity to have its say in relation to the shortlisted candidates.

#### Ad para 61

109. The contents of this paragraph are admitted.

#### Ad paras 62 - 63

- 110. I do not have direct knowledge of Corruption Watch's engagements with the Information Regulator. I can therefore neither admit nor deny the contents of these paragraphs.
- 111. I do, however, note that Corruption Watch's request to the Information Regulator for its intervention was highly irregular, as well as being unjustified.

#### Ad para 64

112. I admit receipt of the letter dated 11 November 2022. I deny the contents thereof.

I have addressed the content of this letter above.

### Ad para 65

113. The contents of this paragraph are admitted.

### Ad paras 66 - 69

- 114. I do not have direct knowledge of Corruption Watch's engagements with the President. I can therefore neither admit nor deny the contents of these paragraphs.
- 115. As I have addressed above, however, the President engaged with the Speaker and the Portfolio Committee before appointing members to the Commission, and satisfied himself that the public involvement process followed was in line with the Constitution and the relevant statutory framework.

### Ad para 70

116. The contents of this paragraph are admitted.

### Ad para 71

117. I deny that this application was necessary. As I have set out above, the public involvement process was more than reasonable in allowing a meaningful opportunity for input on the recommendation process.

### Ad paras 72 - 73

118. As I have addressed above, I admit the existence of a duty to facilitate public involvement. I submit that the process adopted by the Portfolio Committee was entirely reasonable in the circumstances of this case.

### Ad para 74

- 119. I deny that the failure to meaningfully facilitate public involvement automatically invalidates the appointment of members of the Commission. In this regard the Court has discretion to grant any relief that it considers to be just and equitable.
- 120. In any event, I deny that Parliament failed to discharge its duty to facilitate public involvement. The process followed was more than reasonable.

### Ad paras 75 - 77

- 121. I admit the importance of the Chapter 9 institutions and the role that they play in supporting our constitutional democracy.
- 122. I further admit the importance of public involvement in legislative processes in our constitutional democracy. It is clear from what I have set out above that Parliament (and specifically the Portfolio Committee) facilitated a process of meaningful public involvement in line with its obligations.

### Ad para 78

123. While I admit the duty to facilitate reasonable public involvement in the recommendations for appointment to Chapter 9 institutions, I deny that it is appropriate to transplant the principles applicable to the legislative process, onto the process for such recommendations.

1/2/

124. As I have addressed above, the processes are distinct and will require different forms of public involvement. In the context of recommendations for appointment to Chapter 9 institutions, there is a rigorous screening and vetting process that takes place in addition to the receipt of submissions from members of the public. It is also important to ensure that any process does not leave important institutions inquorate and unable to discharge their constitutional mandates.

### Ad paras 79 - 80

125. I have addressed Parliament's discretion and the extent to which the Court may interfere with that discretion above.

### Ad paras 81 - 82

126. The contents of these paragraphs are denied for the reasons set out above.

### Ad paras 83 - 88

127. The contents of these paragraphs are denied.

- 128. For the reasons set out above, I deny that there was insufficient information about each candidate to allow for meaningful participation in the recommendation process. The publication of each candidate's qualifications allowed for sufficient engagement on their suitability for appointment to the Commission.
- 129. Moreover, the Portfolio Committee never intended for the full curriculum vitae of each candidate to be published. I regret that the use of this terminology caused confusion.

### Ad paras 89 - 94

- 130. I have set out above the basis for the Portfolio Committee's approach to the POPI Act. Given the breadth of its application and the importance of the rights it in place to safeguard, the Portfolio Committee deemed it necessary to err on the side of caution in its processing of personal information.
- 131. In any event, the information that was made available to members of the public was sufficient to enable meaningful public involvement in the recommendation process.

### Ad paras 95 - 102

- 132. I do not have direct knowledge of the processes referred to in these paragraphs. In particular, I do not have knowledge of whether the candidates in the examples referred to consented to the wide publication of their curricula vitae. I confirm that in the case of recommendations for appointment to the Commission, the shortlisted candidates did not consent to this.
- 133. It also bears noting that the fact that other processes may have been conducted differently does not render the process followed in these circumstances unreasonable. Each process is to be assessed in its own context, based on the applicable facts and circumstances.
- 134. In these circumstances, the details of each candidate's qualifications was made available. I submit that this met the standard of reasonableness.

K

### Ad paras 103 - 105

135. The contents of these paragraphs are denied.

136. I have addressed the issue of the length of submissions above. In particular, I noted that while no other interested parties appeared unable to make their submissions within the applicable word limits, Corruption Watch was afforded the opportunity to make lengthier submissions. It did not take up this opportunity.

### Ad paras 106 - 110

137. The contents of these paragraphs are denied.

- 138. As I have addressed above, when regard is had to the timeframes applicable to other processes involving recommendations for appointment to Chapter 9 institutions, the time periods provided for in these circumstances are manifestly reasonable.
- 139. The time sensitivity in this instance was also particularly applicable, given that the Commission would become inquorate once the vacancies arose and would be unable to discharge its constitutional mandate until appointments were made. This is not negated by the terms of section 4(2) of the Act. While the commission may be capable of taking decisions where a vacancy exists, it certainly cannot do so where no quorum can be constituted.

140. I therefore deny that there was any self-imposed urgency as alleged, nor was there any truncation in the process ordinarily followed by Parliament.

### Ad paras 111 - 112

141. I admit that this Court has the requisite jurisdiction to entertain this dispute.

### Ad paras 113 - 114

142. For the reasons set out above, the contents of these paragraphs are denied.

### Ad para 115

143. In the event that this Court is in agreement with Corruption Watch that Parliament did not adequately discharge its constitutional obligations (which is denied), I submit that it would be appropriate to suspend the order to enable the matter to be remedied without an undue disruption to the discharge by the Commission of its mandate.

### Ad paras 116 - 118

144. The contents of these paragraphs are noted.

### Ad para 119

145. I deny that Corruption Watch is entitled to the relief sought.

WHEREFORE the first respondent seeks an order dismissing the application with costs.

He said the DPP is appointed by the President on the recommendation of the National Assembly for such a period as the President may determine at the time of such appointment, but not exceeding seven years. The DPP may at the end of his or her term be reappointed for one additional term. The annual salary for the position is R1 924 542.

The person recommended for appointment as DPP must be a South African citizen, who is a fit and proper person to hold such office, and who:

- Is admitted as an advocate or an attorney and has, for a cumulative period of at least 10 years after having been so admitted, practiced as an advocate or an attorney; or
- 2. Is qualified to be admitted as an advocate or an attorney and has, for a cumulative period of at least

- 10 years after having so qualified, lectured in law at a university; or
- 3. Has specialised knowledge of or experience in, for a cumulative period of at least 10 years, the administration of justice, public administration or public finance; or
- 4. Has, for a cumulative period of at least 10 years, been a member of Parliament; or
- Has acquired any combination of experience mentioned in paragraphs (a) to (d), for a cumulative period of at least 10 years.

Nominations/applications must contain a curriculum vitae (CV) providing the nominee/applicant's:

- Full name, ID number and gender;
- Contact details, including physical address, telephone/cell phone number and email address;
- Relevant previous work experience (including relevant dates and organisations concerned); and
- Academic qualifications.

Mr Magwanishe said a list of all the nominations/applications received will be published in order to allow members of the public to comment on the suitability of candidates. He said the shortlisted candidates will be subjected to a screening process.

## Public Protector Ad Hoc Committee to Publish Names of Candidates for Public Scrutiny

Parliament, Wednesday 01 June 2016 – The Ad hoc Committee established to nominate a person for the appointment of Public Protector has agreed to publish names of people that would have been nominated or applied to serve as the new Public Protector.

Committee Chairperson, Dr Makhosi Khoza, said publishing the names of nominees or applicants is critical for public involvement. "Soliciting views from the public is in keeping with our Constitutional obligation, hence our unanimous decision to allow members of the public an opportunity to make their comments or objections on whether a particular name is fit and proper to be considered for the position of the Public Protector,"

Dr Khoza further said objections against a particular nominee or applicant will not mean automatic disqualification. "The Committee will have to investigate any objection before making a determination on the suitability of a particular nominee or applicant," added Dr Khoza

The Committee adopted a programme which has a strong focus on public participation.

The programme will be kick-started by publishing of an advert on all major national, regional and local news papers from 03 June 2016 with the closing date of 24 June 2016. Efforts are underway to ensure the advert is aired on a number of radio stations as well as on Parliament's multimedia platforms.

The Committee agreed that the advert should not be limited to people that will be nominated by various individuals or groups, but should also encourage individuals who believe that they meet the requirements to send their applications.

Members of the public will get an opportunity to make their comments or objections on the names of nominees or applicants that will be made public immediately after the closing date of the advert and finalisation of related processes. The period for members of the public to make their comments or objections is expected to run from 27 June to 01 July 2016. Members of the public will be duly informed on which platforms these names will be published.

After the public participation process, the Committee will convene for short listing during the week of 11 to 15 July 2016 with interviews expected to be held on 10 August 2016.

Dr Khoza said, the programme has been formulated to ensure the Committee is able to table its report of its preferred nominee to the National Assembly on 31 August 2016.

According to Dr Khoza, the Ad Hoc Committee nominee would have to be supported by more than 60% of National Assembly members before the President can act on it.

### 1. Introduction

The Chairperson officially opened the meeting and welcomed Members of the Committee and the staff. She apologised that the meeting started late due to IT challenges experienced in Parliament and travel delays experienced by Members of the Committee. Hereafter, she outlined the purpose of the meeting indicating that Dr Tembe would present on the criteria for

shortlisting process and Ms Abrahams and Ms Levendale would present on the outcomes of the applications received. The Chairperson also indicated that the documents with the list of applications received would be circulated to Members of the Committee in the meeting and urged Members to treat the document with confidentiality as it contains personal information of applicants.

In addition, the Chairperson reported that the Committee received two letters from Corruption Watch and OUTA who requested an extension for the submission of applications. She indicated that the request was declined as the Committee provided sufficient time for members of the public to submit their application. She also reported that the Committee received a request from an applicant who could not submit her application as she was not informed by the NGO which nominated her that she was supposed to fill in an online application and requested to be considered. To this end, the Chairperson also indicated that there were two late applications which was attributed to networks challenges and load-shedding experienced in some other areas. As such, and the Chairperson requested Members of the Committee to take a decision on whether to accept those late applications or not. The Chairperson then handed over to Dr Tembe, Ms Abrahams and Ms Levendale to present their reports.

## 2. Presentation on criteria for short-listing process for the filling of vacancies in the Commission for Gender Equality

The Legal Officer from the OISD presented on the criteria for short-listing process for the filling of vacancies in the Commission for Gender Equality. The Legal Adviser indicated that the purpose of the presentation was to proffer advise to the PC on Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities on the practical factors to be considered by the Committee on the shortlisting process so that most suitable candidates for the current and upcoming vacancies in the Commission for Gender Equality (CGE) can be recruited. His presentation focused on the background of the current vacancies that exists in the CGE; constitutional and legal framework; Commissioner's Handbook; comment and advice provided to the Committee on the criteria for shortlisting candidates.

### 3. Presentation on the outcomes of applications received.

The Content Adviser, Ms Abrahams and Ms Levendale presented a document on the outcomes of the applications received. Ms Abrahams focussed covered the introduction, background on vacancies that currently exists in the CGE and the Commissioners term of office. Ms Levendale provided an analysis of the applications received which included the demographic profile of applicants received, applicants by province and gender, applicants by race, applicants received by disability, applicants by employment status and applicants by nomination. Ms Abrahams then concluded with the way forward and outlined the shortlisting process for identifying suitable candidates for Commissioners to serve in the Commission for Gender Equality.

### 4. Deliberations

The Committee deliberated on the two applications that were received late and agreed to consider them given the circumstances and the communication received by the secretariat in that regard. The Committee also resolved not to consider request for late applications from

persons nominated by organisations as those nominators' were responsible for informing their candidate to submit the application on time.

Furthermore, the Committee deliberated on the reports presented by Dr Tembe and Ms Abrahams outlining the criteria for shortlisting candidates. Thereafter, the Committee adopted both reports. Ms Phiri moved for the adoption of the reports and this was seconded by Mr Mphithi. The Committee also resolved to conclude the shortlisting of candidates on Wednesday, 24 August 2022 at 09:30. In addition, the Committee also agreed to shortlist 24 candidates to be interviewed for the filling of vacancies in the Commission for Gender Equality.

### 5. General issues

**GBV** 

The Chairperson noted with concern what appeared to be the of increase in gender-based violence (GBV) cases in August which is women's month. She mentioned the 8 women who were raped in Krugersdorp, Gauteng Province and other GBV cases that were reported in the news in various other provinces.

### Enyobeni tragedy

The Chairperson also mentioned the media reports where families of children who were involved in the Enyobeni Tavern tragedy in the Eastern Cape Province have complained that they have still not received a final forensic report which would indicate why their children died. The media reports also indicated that families complained that they have not received any counselling services from the Provincial Department of Social Development as promised by the Department.

In this regard, the Committee agreed to engage with the Eastern Cape Provincial Department of Social Development to indicate why families have not received counselling services as promised. Furthermore, the Committee agreed to engage with the Eastern Cape Department of Community Safety and Liaison and the Minister of Police on reasons why the families have not received a full forensic report on the cause of death of their children. The Committee also agreed to meet with the Department of Health on progress made with regards to the toxicology report emanating from the Enyobeni tragedy in the Eastern Cape Province.

### KZN floods impact victims

The Committee also deliberated on the issue of families who were affected by the floods in KwaZulu-Natal Province during April 2022. A Member reported that there were incidents of GBV concerning women and children who are staying in the community halls as they were displaced as a result of the flooding. The Committee agreed to request the Department of Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities to deal with the situation in those halls and to report to the Committee on progress in this regard. Furthermore, the Committee agreed that the relevant KZN provincial departments should be made aware of these incidents and ensure the safety of women and children living at the community halls. The Committee also agreed to conduct an oversight to the KwaZulu-Natal Province in light of the GBV incidents that were reported by a Committee Member.

The Chairperson thanked Members of the Committee for participating in the meeting. Furthermore, she thanked the support staff for presenting the reports and the hard work that as the information would greatly assist Committee members to shortlist their candidates.

## Insufficient information provided to facilitate meaningful public participation in the appointment of CGE Commissioners

- 1. We refer to the above matter.
- 2. On 2 September 2022, the Portfolio Committee on Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities ("the Committee") released a <u>media statement</u> calling on the public to comment on candidates who have been shortlisted to fill vacancies in the Commission for Gender Equality (CGE). The Committee released a spreadsheet that merely provides the names and qualifications of candidates, and asked the public to comment on these shortlisted individuals via an online form which has a 2000 character limitation.
- 3. It is our view that the information provided by the Committee, as well as the character limitation to comment on candidates, will not allow for meaningful public participation in this pertinent appointment process.
- 4. We strongly urge the Committee to follow the precedent set by other parliamentary committees who published redacted CVs on Parliament's website, and allowed comments to be sent directly to the Committee secretary. We also humbly remind the Committee to adhere to the recommendations set out by Chief Justice Raymond Zondo, in his final report on the Judicial Commission of Inquiry into State Capture, which recommends that Parliament "consider whether it is desirable to amend its rules to give effect to the proposals by Corruption Watch on appointments by Parliament".



5. To this end, one of our proposals stated the following:

Ensure that all parliamentary selection processes are transparent and open. Transparency in parliamentary proceedings should involve widely publishing the advertisement for the available position, publishing both the longlist and shortlist of candidates as well as any supporting information that are provided by candidates, sharing the budgets and expenditure related to appointments, and ensuring that interviews and deliberation processes are open and accessible to the public.

6. The principle of public participation is a central tenet in parliamentary appointment processes. Section 59 of the Constitution of the Republic of South Africa requires Parliament to include the public in legislative and other processes. Thus, the public should be reasonably and effectively accommodated during this appointment proceeding. This interaction should be meaningful and not just a symbolic exercise or box-ticking process.

Your letter dated 6 September 2022 bears reference and receipt of its contents is hereby acknowledged.

In essence your correspondence sets out that the information provided to the general public for public involvement in terms of section 59(1)(a) of the Constitution is insufficient and implies that the approach adopted by the PC on Women, Youth and Persons with Disabilities is misguided.

Firstly, one must highlight that the Committee is cognizant of the importance of public involvement in its processes hence invitation for public comment.

Secondly, this section should not be read in isolation, but together with section 57(1) of the Constitution, which gives the Committee, as part of the instrument of the National Assembly the liberty to determine its internal arrangements and make rules and orders regarding transparency and public involvement amongst others, and of course without disregarding the relevant Constitutional imperatives.

Thirdly, the Committee decided to attach academic qualifications of candidates for public assessment of their capabilities and potentials on the parliamentary website. Candidates also filled a form relating to their activism which is accessible to the Parliamentarians. Therefore, the Committee considered this aspect amongst the totality of issues. Section 57(1)(a)-(b) of the Constitution allows the National Assembly through its committees to determine and control its internal arrangement, procedures and also make rules and orders concerning its business, with due regard to representative and participatory democracy, accountability, transparency and public involvement.

Fourthly, the Committee is cognizant of the Protection of Personal Information Act No.4 of 2013 in this recruitment process. The disclosure of the candidates' personal information should be understood within that legal framework prism. The Act aims to give effect to the constitutional right to privacy, by safeguarding personal information when processed by a responsible party, subject to justifiable limitation that are aimed

120

at amongst others: balancing the right to privacy against other rights, particularly the right of access to information. There is no statutory provision which enjoins the extent of disclosure to be made public.

As you might be aware POPIA promotes the protection of personal information processed by public and private bodies and also introduce certain conditions so as to establish minimum requirements for the processing of personal information amongst others.

Fifthly, the mere fact that candidates have opened themselves to public scrutiny on their capabilities and potential in the parliamentary process of recruiting CGE commissioners does not in any negate the fact that we need to observe the POPIA safeguard provisions. The Committee resolved to be very cautious in its approach brought by the developments of POPIA. Section 2(a) of the Act provides that the purpose of it, is to concretize the constitutional right to privacy, by safeguarding personal information when processed by a responsible party, subject to justifiable limitations that are aimed at balancing the right to privacy against other rights, particularly the right of access to information. Public participation for comments does not supersede the primacy safeguarded by this legislation. The candidates have reasonable expectations that their information would be treated with the confidentiality it deserves and protected from unlawful use and access.

One needs to emphasize "informational privacy" requires greater legal protection because technological advances have facilitated the collection, retention and dissemination of personal information in an electronic form. This also encompass a related interest in having access to personal information that has been collected by others in order to ascertain its contents and to check its accuracy. In a measured manner the Committee believes the avenues and the information supplied suffices for public participation.

Should individuals or civic organizations have additional information they wish to submit in relation to the candidates, they must feel free to do so to the Chairperson or Secretary of the Portfolio Committee. The Committee would not disqualify an individual because of negative public comment without offering audi alteram partem to the concerned candidate and weighing its gravity in relation to the position applied for. Furthermore, please be advised that the Committee will also conduct its own screening through the State Security Intelligence for the vetting to be completed by the appointing authority.

Lastly, the process of public involvement for comment the processes also involve screening by State Security Agents that includes checks on the personal information of the candidates.

I hope this suffices for your complaint.
